Jim Cummins, an Irishman born in Dublin, with a rich academic career in Canada, is a spokesperson for language rights, a world expert on minority languages and one of the leading advocates for bilingualism and bilingual education. He has taught for many years at the Department of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning of the University of Toronto. His research focuses on the challenges educators face in adjusting to classrooms where cultural and linguistic diversity is the norm. He has published hundreds of articles and books, including: *Language, Power and Pedagogy: Bilingual Children in the Crossfire* (Multilingual Matters, 2000); *Identity Texts: The Collaborative Creation of Power in Multilingual Schools* (Trentham Books, Ltd, 2010), co-authored with Margaret Early, *Literacy, Technology, and Diversity: Teaching for Success in Changing Times* (Allyn & Bacon/Merrill Professional Development 2006), co-authored with Kristin Brown and Dennis Sayers; *Brave New Schools: Challenging Cultural Illiteracy Through Global Learning Networks* (St. Martin's Press 1997 (co-authored with Dennis Sayers).
